Explanation of MRP codes:

Dues Paid: Full dues paid to the District and to International. See your club treasurer for details.

Service Hours: All community service hours completed between March 1, 2011 and February 29, 2012. A member must be dues paid before counting service hours. See the MRP Frequently Asked Questions to see what specifically counts as a service hour.

Kiwanis Family hosted K-Fam Event (KF): A Kiwanis Family event hosted by a non- Circle K, Kiwanis Family club. The event can involve any other Kiwanis Family clubs.

The Kiwanis Family includes: Kiwanis, Circle K, Key Club, KIWIN'S, Aktion, Builders and K-Kids. To count as a KF event, there must be at least TWO members present from your Circle K club and at least two members present from the other Kiwanis Family organization. Examples include attending a Kiwanis luncheon, a Key club meeting, a Kiwins club or divisional or banquet, etc. If less than 2 members are present, it is counted as administrative hours.

Circle K hosted K-Fam Event (CK): A Kiwanis Family event hosted by a Circle K club.

An event involving any other Kiwanis Family clubs. The Kiwanis Family includes: Kiwanis, Circle K, Key Club, KIWIN'S, Aktion, Builders and K-Kids. To count as a CK event, there must be at least TWO members present from your Circle K club and at least two members present from the other Kiwanis Family organization. Examples include attending a Key to College, a Circle K meeting, a Circle K club divisional or banquet, etc. If less than 2 members are present, it is counted as administrative hours.

Divisional (DV): An event hosted by your Lieutenant Governor (LTG) for all the clubs in your division. Examples include Divisional Council Meetings (DCM), divisional socials, service projects, banquets, retreats, etc.

District (DE): An event that is organized and hosted by the District Board. These events include Spring Training Conference (STC) North and South, Presidents' Retreat, International Convention (ICON), District Summer Service Social (DSSS), Crazy Kompetion for Infants (CKI) North and South, Fall Training Conference (FTC), District Large Scale Service Project (DLSSP) North and South, District Convention (DCON), and our District Board Meetings.

Interclub (IN): Any event hosted by another Circle K or K-Family organization.

- If your club has 20 or fewer members, at least TWO members present from your Circle K club and at least TWO members present from the other Kiwanis Family Organization.
- If your club has 21-30 members, at least THREE members present from your Circle K club and at least THREE members present from the other Kiwanis Family Organization.
- If your club has 31 or more members, at least FOUR members present from your Circle K club and at least FOUR members present from the other Kiwanis Family Organization

Fundraiser (FR): An event that raises money for either your club or for a charitable organization. If 100% of the proceeds are being donated to a charitable entity, the fundraiser is counted as a service project only for those individuals that help plan the event will receive service hours. Those that attend the event where 100% of the proceeds go to a charity then that does not count as a service event. If the proceeds go to the club's administrative fund, the fundraiser is not considered service but it is considered administrative hours.

Membership Development & Education (MD): An event that helps in the retention, development, and education of new and old members. Examples include membership drives, member retreats, care packs for your members, etc.

Social (SE): Any type of fun event within your club or with other members from the Kiwanis family. Examples include movie nights, club dinners, baseball games, beach outings, recreational activities, etc. An event that is purely social does not count as service.

What is the difference between a Social Event (SE) and an MD&E Event (MD)? They sound the same to me.

There also might be confusion about what defines a Social Event (SE) and what defines a MD&E (MD) event. There are examples below clearly defining Social Events and MD&E Events.

Examples of Socials events:

- Food Socials
- Bowling
- Board Game Night
- Hiking
- Water Balloon Fight
- Pizza Night
- Scavenger Hunts

Examples of MD&E events:

- Fall, Winter, Spring Installs/Inductions
- Anything related to member of the month, member of the week, etc.
- Workshops/CKI 101
- Anything related to educating members about Circle K, leadership training, etc. could be considered an MD&E event.

Example of both MD&E and Social Events:

- Family Socials/Activities
- Anything related to family gatherings and/or mentoring programs

International (INT): An event held throughout all of Circle K International, such as International Convention (ICON) and Large Scale Service Project (LSSP). **Article Submissions:** An article or other item emailed to the District Publications Editor for use in District publications. The article will not necessarily be utilized, but the author will still receive credit for submission. District publications include, but are not limited to, the Sunburst and the MBMML (Member BiMonthly Mailing List). The last date for submission of articles is February 15th.

Club Committee Member: Involvement in any committee within the club. The chair of the committee is also considered a member of said committee. Subcommittees do not qualify.

Chair an Event: The chair, or contact person, for a particular event. An event chair's duties vary by club. But, generally the chair is in charge of verifying the event is planned thoroughly and that everything is prepared. During the event, the chair acts as the contact person for the members and makes sure that the project runs smoothly.

Host a District Workshop: The host, or co-host, of a workshop at a District event. These events are Spring Training Conference North and South, Presidents' Retreat, Fall Training Conference, District Convention, or any other District-sanctioned event. Workshop hosts will be verified by the event chair.

District/Divisional Committee Member: Involvement in any District or Divisional committee. To receive credit for involvement in a committee, the member must attend 80% of all committee meetings, unless otherwise arranged with the District Chair. The member also must fulfill all responsibilities and commitments as put forth on the committee application. District Chairs will verify member's involvement at the end of the term. Subcommittees do not qualify unless the District Chair can verify significant member contribution. Being on an International Committee also fulfills this requirement.

Club or District Leadership Position: A leadership position within a committee, club, division or District. This includes executive officers, committee chairs and subcommittee chairs. Within this category, be sure to list your specific title (i.e. Donations Chair on the District Convention Committee).
